LEWISBURG LITERARY FESTIVAL RETURNS AUGUST 4-5

The Lewisburg Literary Festival will once again take place the first weekend in August. The 2023 festival will feature Lynda Rutledge, author of the bestselling novel West With Giraffes, which has been a popular book club selection and translated into 15 languages. Other speakers include Kentucky novelist and NPR commentator Silas House, Pulitzer Prize winning investigative journalist Eric Eyre, and author Joy Callaway, whose novel The Grand Design is based on Dorothy Draper's celebrated work as

interior designer at The Greenbrier. Ms. Callaway will be in conversation with Dr. Robert Conte, the resort's longtime historian.

Since 2012 the festival has been cel-



ebrating literature and promoting reading in the Greenbrier Valley by featuring bestselling authors speaking about their works, offering writing workshops, providing booksellers with a venue and presenting ancillary events ranging from movies and plays to hands-on activities for adults and children. All events are free to the public, with costs underwritten by grants from local family foundations and the City of Lewisburg, and sponsorships from businesses and individuals.


















LEWISBURG LITERAY FESTIVAL

"We wondered if we should have the literary festival on our traditional weekend this year since it coincides with the LIV golf tournament at The Greenbrier," says Josh Baldwin, the festival's board president. "We ultimately decided to go ahead with it because the events draw different crowds."

Joy Callaway's presentation will take place at Greenbrier Valley Theatre on Friday, Aug. 4, at 7 p.m. Saturday's schedule at Carnegie Hall features Eric Eyre in conversation with Lewisburg attorney Derek Teaney at 1 p.m., Silas House in conversation with local writer Eric Fritzius at 3 p.m., and Lynda Rutledge in conversation with A New Chapter bookstore co-owner Shaye Gadomski at 7 p.m.

The four events are ticketed, with free tickets available at the Greenbrier County Convention and Visitors Center. "It's particularly important to get tickets for the Callaway/Conte event," Literary Festival program director Greg Johnson points out. "GVT has more limited seating than Carnegie Hall, and only 140 tickets are available."

"We're immensely grateful to the donors whose generosity enables us to have a literary festival," Josh Baldwin adds. "When we started in 2012, we didn't know if we were having a onetime celebration or if the festival would become an annual event. It's obviously something the community values, or we wouldn't still be here eleven years later."

Other Literary Festival events include the following FREE workshops, all held at the Greenbrier County CVB:

-"Okay, I Wrote it... Now What?" Craft of Writing Workshop with Tim Huguenin on August 4 at 6 p.m.

-"Wandering Outside of Your Fences" Poetry Workshop with Cheryl Denise on August 5 at 9:30 a.m.

-"Understanding Story" Fiction Writing Workshop with Sheila Redling and Tobi Doyle on August 5 at 11 a.m.

Greenbrier County Public Library Book Sale Upcoming

The popular book sale will coincide with the Lewisburg Literary Festival

The annual Greenbrier County Public Library Book Sale will take place on Friday and Saturday, August 4 and 5, in the community room in the basement of the library.

The sale will feature more 15,000 books, according to Library Director Ann Farr. Adult fiction and nonfiction, children's fiction, and audio/visual materials are featured in the sale. A plus for book lovers is that the sale coincides with the Lewisburg Literary Festival taking place downtown that same weekend.

The sale opens at 152 Robert W. Mc-Cormick Drive in downtown Lewisburg at noon Friday, Aug. 4, and runs until 6 p.m. On Saturday, Aug. 5, the sale starts

at 9 a.m. and closes at 2 p.m. On Friday, books will be priced at \$2 for hard-covers and \$1 for paperbacks. Saturday shoppers can buy books for \$5 a bag. (The bags are supplied by the library.) The book sale accepts credit cards and checks, as well as cash.

Shoppers are advised there is no elevator service from the first floor to the book sale in the library's basement.

This annual fundraiser is sponsored by The Friends of the Greenbrier County Public Library. The group started in 1979 as an organization dedicated to promoting awareness of services provided by public libraries. Proceeds from the sale support library activities, services and programs.


ack in 2019 the Williamsburg Volunteer Fire Department decided to start a festival as a fundraiser to help update their outdated equipment, and to purchase needed new equipment. Our department is like most departments in the state and runs off of volunteerism, state funding, donations from the community, fundraisers, and grants (which are hard to get due to the location and population of our area). When Covid hit, we were forced to reconsider the festival and decided to not have one due to everyone's safety.

Last year our festival was enjoyed by many, and this year we are planning for a bigger festival and more participants coming to enjoy the outdoors under the stars. This year's festival is called Williamsburg's Back Home Festival, and runs all day from 1 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Wednesday, September 2.

The day will be filled with a variety of live music, including Ben Hersman and Sons of the Mountains. Ben and his band are a well-known group in these parts and are from Greenbrier County. They grew up on the music of the Appalachians and perform cover songs and their own originals. You'll hear them playing "Rocky Top" and "Old Time Rock and Roll" in the same set. The band's name was inspired by one of West Virginia's first military units that made a name for themselves at Gettysburg and in other Civil War Battles: the 7th West Virginia Infantry. Thus came the same "The Sons of the Mountains."

Alleghany Countdown from Bluefield, VA led by Virgil Harden, will also be playing. Virgil has been involved in the music industry for most of his life and loves entertaining people and watching the enjoyment that music brings to the heart. Alleghany Countdown plays bluegrass and has played for the festival several times with some great sounds. They have thought about retiring, but realized just how much they loved providing music for the people that come to hear them. Virgil is such a talented musician and holds this group together with the great pride in their music.

A HISTORY OF THE WILLIAMSBURG Volunteer Fire Department

The Williamsburg Fire Department started by the community of Williamsburg with a 1946 Chevrolet chassis fire truck that was purchased from Danville, VA Fire dept. for \$1,100. It would carry 300 gallons of water and pump 500 gallons a minute.

Fire Department members at that time included Fire Chief Jim Thomas, Assistant Chief Charlie Bransford, Captain Rondell Fletcher, Sec't/ Treasurer Charlie Simmons, and President Ben Gee, as well as Buck Withrow, Lawrence Owens, Harry Hume, Alvin Sykes, Berlin Judy, Darrell Judy, Elmer Hedrick Jr., Rupert Spencer, Glen Simmons, Ira Simmons, Duke Johnson, John Viers, and Charles Harrah. All these young men attended fire school at Lewisburg every Thursday night. The fire truck was kept in readiness at the warehouse behind the Dwight Miller store. If there was a fire, calls would be placed to Harry Hume or Charlie Bransford, and if there was no answer they would call Owens



Mill. Numbers were published for each.

In 1972, Howard Schoonmaker, a retired fireman from Patterson, NJ, moved into the area and rejuvenated the department with his skills and expert knowledge and leadership. The department has gone through some tough times, ups and downs over the many years they have been in business.

We are now 17 members strong with the firefighters and auxiliary member, three fire trucks and a brush truck, radios for communications, and a nice fire house to store our equipment that also has a kitchen and a bedroom. We still do whatever it takes to help our community in whatever way we can.

The Thomas Taylor Band is led by Thomas and has an amazing traditional country and western swing music sound. His songs are heard thoughout the state, and they are a great dance band with music we can sing along with that we know and love. Band members include lead vocals/guitar- Thomas Taylor, pedal drum/steel guitar- Don Drummer, drums- Butch White, fiddle- Jerry Wood, piano- Bill Clapham, lead guitar/sax- Alan Copenhaver, and bass- Marty Wells.

Greener Pastures debuted in Ronceverte, WV at the Food Truck Festival, showcasing the vocal talents of David Lynch and Kimberly Dawn, keyboardist Virgil Kris Kelly, Jason Cooper on bass, Tom France on drums, and Andei Kharasov on guitar. They are a brand-new band playing a variety of songs including blues, soul, rock, pop, and funk, with cover songs we all know and love. A resident of Williamsburg, Virgil was the mastermind with the leadership of getting this great group of musicians together to form this band.

This year the Williamsburg's Back Home Festival will offer the Tahoe and DARE of Lewisburg Groups for an awesome evening of vehicles on display for all to enjoy. These groups have many wonderful members and sharplookin' vehicles.

An array of vendors including jewelry, Tupperware, tiedye clothing, a demo on spinning wool into yarn by Linda Wells, ukulele played by the gifted Gabby Garnant, fire dancer Ahlee Dee, redneck horseshoes, and a rock climbing wall compliments of the Army National Guard. A gun raffle will be drawn the day of the festival. There will also be a live food auction with a variety of foods that have been baked, cooked, or canned by local men and women. Whoever makes the highest bid on the food items wins the prize!

There are available camp sites without hookups for \$20, and plenty of stars overhead to enjoy. So come bring your chair or pop-up and stay a while. Some canopies will be set up on site.

Food onsite includes grilled fresh chicken, homemade potato salad and baked beans, and homemade slaw, Dippin' Dots ice cream, cotton candy, and grilled hotdogs with all the fixings.

This is a major fundraiser for the Williamsburg Volunteer Fire Department and all proceeds go to the department. The Festival is held behind the Williamsburg Fire Department 6571 Shoestring Trail Williamsburg, WV.

Hawk Knob Appalachian Hard Cider & Mead shared an exciting update last month with the news that there will be a "resurgence of Greenbrier Valley Brewing." Josh Bennett, owner and founder of Hawk Knob, said that the cidery has acquired GVBC, and that they will be bringing back the four most popular GVBC beers as soon as they possibly can.

Devil Anse (IPA), Wild Trail (pale ale), Mothman (black IPA), and Braxxie (blonde ale) are all planned to return to market, with Josh saying in late July he hopes it will be as little as 6 weeks before consumers can once again find GVBC products for purchase.

"After the first four we plan to brew some other stuff on the small batch system," said Bennett. "And as soon as we have beer to serve, the taproom will be open."

When HashtagWV asked Josh about a potential return of the beloved Batboy (black lager), Josh promised, "It will be back," and hinted that he has some exciting plans in the works in that department.

Bennett explained that they hope to get a tavern license for the GVBC taproom so guests can also purchase Hawk Knob Cider products and a selection of guest taps. With a tavern license, they also plan to also serve some assorted foods.

Visitors can also expect to see familiar faces, as a majority of the old GVBC crew has stayed on deck for this new adventure!



"I'm really excited for the opportunity to bring these beers back into West Virginia," said Bennett, "and we look forward to being also to serve everyone in the tap room again."

In another exciting development, Josh announced that Hawk Knob plans to start offering cans of some of their newer ciders that have previously only been available via kegs. Salty Beach, Cellar Door, and Bloody Session will all have cans available for purchase here soon.



The Classic Steel Magnolias Prepares for its GVT Debut

any will know Robert Harling's classic Steel Magnolias because of the film starring Dolly Parton, Sally Field, and Julia Roberts. What you may not know is that the

film, released in 1989, is actually an adaptation of Harling's play that came out two years earlier. Written to honor his late sister, Steel Magnolias explores the day-to-day life of six women as they spend their time talking and laughing while getting their hair styled.

The production of this popular title will open at GVT in September with some familiar faces. Erin Jerozal (I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change) will lead the cast as salon owner, Truvy. Wendye Clarendon, Amy Loui, (Silent Sky) Emily Bosco, (Pride and Prejudice) Kelsey Hofe, and mainstay Cathey Sawyer will complete the group of women who will prove that relationships can be as strong as steel.

Dana Iannuzzi (Murder For Two) returns to Greenbrier Valley Theatre to direct the production. Iannuzzi believes that art is not only about creating a dramatic point, but also about showing life as it actually is. She believes this is the beauty that comes with Harling's writing, and is looking forward to capturing those moments on stage.

"Far too often we get caught up in the extraordinary days and neglect the small moments that encapsulate who we are as people," said Iannuzzi. "Love. Friendship. Grief. Happiness. Life. Sadness. This is what it is to be human."

The production will feature scenic design completed byFrank Ludwig, costume design by Jenna Fawn Brown, and lighting design by E. Tonry Lathroum. Sound design is completed by Abigail Coppock, with prop design by Ashton Webb. Richard Crowell serves as Production Manager, Elizabeth Salisch as Production Stage Manager, who will be assisted by Mallory Topel.

Now in its 56th season, Greenbrier Valley Theatre is a mainstay and theatre destination located in Lewisburg. The arts organization has been further recognized as a "West Virginia Jewel of the Hills," awarded the Living the Dream Service Organization Honor Roll by The Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Commission, and is a multiyear recipient of Non-Profit Business of the Year. GVT boasts a robust series of year-round programing and educational offers with the goal to enlighten, enrich, and enliven throughout the region.

Steel Magnolias opens at GVT on September1st and runs through the 9th. Tickets are \$32 for general seating, \$29 for senior citizens age 60 and above, and \$20 for students. his month we spent some time up in the picturesque northern part of Greenbrier County located up 219, sampling just a small selection of all the things to do outside of the hubbub of the main city limits. Some people might consider this part of the county as an area to just drive-through on the way on to bigger and better

things further north, like Snowshoe, but that's not the case!

When you head north of Lewisburg on 219, it's a beautiful drive with stunning valley views on both sides once you pass Maxwelton. It's really a small teaser of all the fun to be had in this slower-paced corner of the world. I recommend taking summer day trips on a Saturday, as not all businesses are open every weekend!

BLUEBERRY PICKING:

We toured several of the lovely blueberry farms and spent hours out in the serene blueberry fields picking away. There's something special about blueberry picking, that not only comes from the hunt for the ripest, juiciest berries (and there are a lot!) but something about simply wandering around with friends and family in the tranquil countryside with nothing but each others' company. Blueberry picking is a unique opportunity to be outside with all ages, young and all, engaged in the same pickin' mission and just enjoying the moment.

White Oak Berry Farm, Renick

White Oak Farm is owned and operated by Max and Anne Robinson, and they planted the first blueberries on their farm in the fall of 1993. The pickyour-own blueberries have been a popular staple in the Renick area for years, but in addition to growing blueberries they raise and grow a lot of their own food with some extras to sell. They have a milk cow, beef cows, sheep, and chickens. Eggs are available for purchase at the check-in stand.

Hours: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 4 to 8 p.m. Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Closed Wednesday and Sunday.

Directions: In Renick, turn onto Brownstown Road, drive 1.5 miles, White Oak Farm will be on the right with a sign. Addresss; 1700 Brownstown Road, Renick.

Friendly Goat Fruit Farm, Renick

Friendly Goat Fruit Farm is owned by Herb and Rene Ley and is aptly named for their friendly goats that they raise on the property. They offer pick-your-own blueberries and also blackberries later on in the season. They have other goods for sale, like maple syrup and jams, at their tent. Herb says that they planted their first blueberries six years ago, and that they have four varieties of berries.

"I say we have a rule about eating blueberries in the field- 'As many as you like!"

He states his farm is about fun, family,




and being good Christians, and is a passion project for his family. With peak blueberry season ending in early August, it's best to come out before it's too late in the season.

Hours: Monday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day. Closed Sundays.

OTHER ACTIVITIES:

After blueberry picking, there are plenty of ways to cool off in the countryside. Consider a shady, leisurely walk on the non-as-crowded section of the Greenbrier River Trail at Anthony, or one of the many swimmin' holes along the way. With a newly-graveled boat launch right off of Anthony Road, it also makes a great spot for fishing!

Greenbrier River Boat Launch at Anthony

The Anthony boat launch is arguably one of the easiest ways to get in the water if you have a large group of people wanting to float or spend a day swimming. With a parking lot and boat launch ramp that have been recently redone, there is easy, ample parking just steps away from a lovely rocky beach area. This makes it easy to set up multiple chairs for a group, but I wouldn't recommend laying out just towels due to the rocks. You get an awesome view of the bridge over the river from this spot as well!

Greenbrier River Trail: Anthony Section/Droop Mountain Tunnel

The Greenbrier River Trail is just

adjacent to the Anthony boat launch if you'd rather stroll north and dip off on one of the many, smaller water accesses there. Park at the Anthony lot and walk north less than 10 minutes to access a set of steps leading down to a great rock with a 2-4 foot deep swimming hole. One of the most impressive features of the entire trail lies further north: The Droop Mountain Tunnel. Drive up 219 until you hit Brownstown Road at Renick, and drive 5.4 miles on Brownstown before turning right onto Rorer Road. Drive past the posted Greenbrier River Trail parking area for a total of roughly 1.4 miles (you're be driving with the trail to your left). There are two parking spots titled "Rorer Trailhead Parking" on Google

Frankford and drive a little over 8 miles to get to the parking area (just off of Anthony).

Blue Bend Swimming Hole

Maps, and walk 5 minutes north to get to

the Droop Mountain Tunnel.

If it's an especially hot day and you need the coldest swim in the county, you want to go to Blue Bend. With bright blue water and easy access, this spot is a local favorite. The Blue Bend Campground is an affordable camping option to those from both near and far, and the recreation area is hard to beat. Turn onto Anthony Road at

Good Roads Bakehouse, Frankford

Truly a diamond in the rough, Good Roads Bakehouse is located in the old space of Lowell's Bakery and has quickly grown in popularity since their opening in 2021. A small batch bakery, they offer a selection of foods each week including

pizza, quiche, homemade pop tarts, pepperoni rolls (you simply MUST try one), sourdoughs, cookies of all sorts, pretzels, and more. It varies each week, so many sure to follow them on Facebook at "Good Roads Bakehouse" for more details on their weekly offerings!






